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


FACEBOOK PASSWORDS: TO SHARE OR NOT TO SHARE?

From accepting friend requests from strangers, to employers finding out about last weekend's party, anyone can "stalk" another person's profile. When given passwords, employers can see anything and everything, including one's personal messages with people which were never intended to be seen by others, as well as wall posts and pictures that may be found to be inappropriate to the prospective employer. 



your money on for the next couple of months. Save up, kick back, and enjoy.







TV stands for Music Television and in the early 1980s its programming represented its title. The original purpose of the channel was to play the most popular music videos guided by video jockeys or "VJ's."

MTV's impact on the music industry and pop culture paved the way for many other music channels that are available today (i.e. VH1, MTV2, CMT).

MTV wanted people to be able to hear the most popular music and watch the most popular videos of the time, and they succeeded for a while. MTV is the most recognized network among young adults ages 12-34 and because of that they took these statistics and ran with them, producing programs more suitable for a younger audience so their programs could try to

be more relatable to those age categories.

After *Total Request Live* or *TRL* went off the air in November 2008, the number of music videos played on MTV took a dramatic nosedive. highly sought after benefit of growing up is the ability to make choices and decisions by oneself. The enforcement of these rules causes a drastic problem for both the students and the administration. By trying too hard to enforce them, the school has fallen short of educating us as teachers waste precious class time inspecting our shorts' lengths rather than filling our brains with useful knowledge. While we try too hard to push the limits of these rules, we have fallen short in the process of learning. To amend this damaging situation, actions need to be taken on both sides to focus school more towards educating and less towards irritating the opposing side.

SHERIFF DOGS DISRUPT EDUCATION:

A CALL FOR ADMINISTRATIVE POLICY REFORM

Upon arriving to the school parking lot on April 11 (aka Drug-Dog Day 2012) your intrepid Editor-in-Chief saw six police officers, three administrators, and four German Shepherd Sheriff Dogs scrapping the BHS parking lot for hints of drugs. As a journalist, this police action, which presented fundamental civil and student rights issues, intrigued me, so I approached the scene for a closer look. However, as a Jew, German Shepherds lead by police make me nervous, so I proceeded with caution.

As an administrator, a dog, and two police officers searched a student's car in joint coalition, I followed my journalistic instincts and tried to take a picture. However, the administrator present stopped me. I found this ironic: hadn't I learned about the First Amendment in government last year? I thought about what Thomas Jefferson or John Adams would do. They would stand up for their rights.

Seeing that my presence in the parking lot was noticeably upsetting the authorities, I decided that it was time to go to Statistics Class, when further controversy arose. A posse of police, administrators, and German Shepherds rushed a car trying to leave the lot. The nervous-sounding teenager driving the vehicle tried to defend himself, vainly challenging the police and administration's right to search him and his vehicle. Under the Fourth Amendment to the Constitution, stopping a moving vehicle requires probable cause to believe a crime has been committed. There was none given to him. However, different rights apply, because under the BSD Code, student drivers "consent, in advance, to the search of his/her vehicle parked on school property when school officials have reason to suspect contraband may be found in the vehicle." He was not parked; he was lawfully moving. Notwithstanding, the police and the administration said what they were doing was legal, and forced the student to park and exit his car. These statements showed a blatant misrepresentation of the student's rights, both Constitutional and those given by Berkley School District Code of Conduct.

Unfortunately, whatever led him to forget his folder that morning, also led to the police officers and Sheriff Dogs finding a pack of rolling papers, a lighter, and what they claim as traces of marijuana in his car. This student, the other one previously mentioned, and four others were all suspended for 10 days.

When asked about the severe punishments imposed on those students caught allegedly or genuinely with contraband, an administrators aid, "When a student gets caught with drugs, it's an automatic 10-day suspension." According to the administration, all punishments were automatic and final, with no room for discussion. However, the BSD Code says, "corrective action will be determined by the administration, in its discretion, in accordance with the severity of the offense, a review of the facts and/ or special circumstances." In the case of drug possession, the Code provides that students may be placed between steps 2-7 on the disciplinary step system. That means at the least a parent-administrator-student conference, and at the most a long-term (between 10 and 180 days) suspension, and/or recommendation for expulsion. It goes on to clarify that, "Because no two situations are exactly alike, administrators will use their best judgment in determining the appropriate disciplinary procedures based on the circumstances of the situation, including mitigating and exacerbating factors." In all situations, factors such as students' disciplinary records, special circumstances, and the variety of misconducts were not considered by administrators in the disciplinary process. The administrators gave their final disciplinary decisions without any chance for students to defend themselves, parents to protect their children, or for anybody to present information pertaining to each circumstance.

When the administration's enforced policy is contrasted with the BSD Code's written policy, some inconsistencies become clear. Not only did administrators misrepresent the Code, they also misapplied it. While the 10-day suspensions assigned were upheld as automatic, with no room for ambiguity, discretion, or discussion, the BSD Code provides for a more thorough investigation and comprehensive assessment of each case individually. However, don't blame the administrators; they were just trying to do their jobs the best they could. Certain details of the BSD Code, like those quoted above, require time and energy to carefully review and accurately follow. Let's face it, guys, our dear administrators work really hard, and the time has come for the student body to appreciate them. We need another authoritative body to share some of their great and many responsibilities with, namely the ones that involve judgment.

The one making the judgments can't be me, because I'm biased; it can't be the Administration, because it's biased; so adding a judicial branch to our BHS government, whose specific task it is to deal with students' and parents' appeals and hear discussion about cases before finalizing punishments would better ensure that students' rights are respected, and more importantly allow administrators time to deal with their many other duties. When students make mistakes, like bringing drugs to school, they deserve proportionate punishments. When administrators make mistakes, like misrepresenting and misapplying the BSD Code, students deserve to be exempted from the consequences following administrative misconduct. Our administrators have rigorous, time-consuming jobs. Let's allow them to share some of their responsibilities by creating a separate BHS judicial body, group, or person.

In the course of assigning discipline, we must ask ourselves what punishments are the most effective, versus what punishments are the most severe. Obviously, student misconduct deserves an administrative response, just not like the ones our administration currently gives out. Not only failing to embrace those troubled students, but also forbidding them from returning to school is not the answer, more school and more education seems a drastically better solution. Putting students on academic probation, as an alternative punishment, would absolutely foster education better than forbidding them from coming to school for 10 days. If the worry is further disruptions, refer them to a school counselor to work out personal issues, or place them on a disciplinary probation, discouraging future misconducts. While the administration perceives suspensions as their most severe form of punishment, much more effective methods for correcting student misconduct exist. Many of which are less harmful to education than suspensions, but still send the message that the given misconduct is unacceptable. Furthermore, many students enjoy these supposed punishments, and delight in spending time away from school. Only as a last resort should the BHS Administrators reject students, telling them, "we don't want you here," because that's a failure on their part: a failure to engage, a failure to inspire, and definitely not a catalyst for higher achievement, as the benchmarks on the cover page of the BSD Code of Conduct state.
