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
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




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


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
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Flint faces contamination: thousands left without clean water

On Jan. 5, Governor Rick Snyder declared a state of emergency in Flint due to the recent news of a contaminated water supply. Flint, Michigan is home to one hundred thousand people, all of whom are currently left without the ability to use running water. Since the recent transition of water supply from Lake Huron to the Flint River, the city's drinking water has had numerous problems regarding an unsafe amount of lead in the water supply, creating a dangerous environment for the residents of Flint.

Lead trapped in pipes leached into the Flint River, leaving about 12,000 homes without clean drinking water. Lead is a highly powerful neurotoxin that can result in serious health risks such as brain damage, behavioral issues, and learning disabilities.

In 2011, the state appointed an emergency manager to save money, and one way to cut costs was to find a cheaper water supply. Plans were then made to find a cheaper route and still utilize the Lake Huron water supply, but those details would not be finalized until 2016. "I think this whole crisis would be a lot different and possibly have never existed if the plans did not take so long to finalize," junior Dana McDowell said.

Nonetheless, in 2014, the city switched to the Flint River as their main source of water until the new plan had been set. As residents had issues with the new water supply over the years, complaining that it smelled bad or tasted odd, it was clear that there was a severe issue at hand. However, officials assured the citizens that the water was indeed safe to drink.

About a year ago, the problem was still present and more signs pointed towards a contaminated water supply. E. coli was found in the river along with a study showing children living in the Flint area had doubled percentages of lead in their body since the switch to the new source of water. In October 2015, the problem was acknowledged, and Flint is currently deeply in need of a safe source of usable water.

As Governor Rick Snyder declared a state of emergency in Flint last week due to the contamination, many residents still believe the problem lies with the governor, who failed

to act upon the situation when it first occurred, years back. "There are definitely a lot of things that the governor could have done differently," McDowell said. Snyder is currently attempting to fix the issue and released a statement in a press conference on Jan. 19, taking much of the blame. "To you, the people of Flint, I say tonight as I have before: I am sorry, and I will fix it," Governor Snyder said. Since then, the U.S. Department of Justice and the Environmental Protection Agency have currently been investigating the state's response to the water crisis.

Thousands of people are coming together to help the city out by donating water bottles and making sure all the residents are safe. Social workers are also currently going door-to-door to ensure that homes have correctly installed water filters and individuals are getting the care they need. It is uncertain when the crisis will be resolved, but the city of Flint is in the midst of one of the most tragic situations they have ever encountered.

Kalamazoo shooting claims the lives of six

On Saturday, Feb. 20, a Michigan resident and Über driver was deemed responsible for the shootings in Kalamazoo, MI. Jason Brian Dalton stands accused of the crimes and was detained by police on Monday, Feb. 22.

Police say that Dalton traveled to three different locations and shot eight different victims. Starting at an apartment complex where he shot a woman, who is expected to live, in front of her children. He then continued to kill a father and son at a car dealership and finished his killing spree by opening fire and killing four women and wounding a 14-year-old girl in a Cracker Barrel parking lot. Police also report that he was actively driving Über passengers in-between shootings.

Kalamazoo College notified all of their students with a 'K-alert,' which included a phone call explaining the crisis. Kalamazoo freshman and BHS graduate Adam Edery said, "We all got the K-alert saying there was a shooter so everyone was kind of scared and stayed in." He continued, "[The next day] things were a bit tense, but I think the community has rallied pretty well and is trying to maintain a positive energy overall."

Western Michigan University, on the other hand, while not being legally required to notify their students of the situation failed to do so, resulting in recent controversy.

Authorities are unsure why the victims were chosen and if there was any connection between them and the killer. As of now Dalton is being charged with six counts of murder, two counts of assault with intent to commit murder, and eight firearms violations, and was denied bail.

CDC warns travelers to stay safe from the Zika virus

In January 2016, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, or CDC, issued travel warnings for any country currently affected by the Zika virus. The usual symptoms of the virus include headaches, fever, and a rash, lasting only a few days. However, it has been found to be more dangerous than previously believed, as the virus has also been linked to be the cause of a serious birth defect.

In pregnant women, the Zika virus infects the unborn child, causing them to develop microcephaly. Children with this birth defect have a head with a circumference much smaller than that of an average newborn. The reduced head size can cause many developmental issues. Mr. Michael Skowronski, anatomy teacher at BHS, said, "The disease leads to severe cognitive impairment. It essentially alters how they think and act."

As of Feb. 22, the CDC reports 82 travelrelated Zika virus cases across 23 states and Puerto Rico.

One of the biggest concerns at this time is

with the upcoming 2016 Summer Olympics which will be held in Brazil, an area that the CDC warns people against travelling to. According to Brazil's Ministry of Health, there have been over 4,000 cases of microcephaly related to the Zika virus since October 2015. Federations and athletes alike are considering skipping the event if they do not feel safe travelling.

As of now, there are no vaccines to protect people against the Zika virus. With no vaccine to be available soon, the only way to prevent the spread of the disease is through caution. Skowronski is content with how the CDC has treated the situation so far. He said, "The response has been good. It has been making people aware, and awareness is the most important thing."

One Indian company, Bharat Biotech, has already been researching a Zika vaccine since December 2014. They were the first to file patents and a brand name for a vaccine, despite being years away from completing it.

Berkley community raises money for triple amputee veteran

Helping others in need is a value instilled within most children from an early age. When it comes to veterans in particular, many people want to give back for all the service they provide our country. In November, the U.S. History classes host a Military Appreciation Day each year while the country as a whole celebrates our heroes' work on Veterans' Day. When Army Veteran Sergeant (SSG) Ben Eberle returned from his tour without three of his limbs, students from Anderson Middle School and Pattengill Elementary School stepped up to help Eberle and his family.

On Wednesday, Jan. 20, SSG Eberle, accompanied by his wife and daughter, was thanked by students, staff, and community members as they made their way down the halls of Anderson Middle School to an assembly held in their honor. Students lined the halls and waved American flags eagerly. The BHS drumline gave a roaring performance, and the choir sang in his honor. "Getting the chance to be at such an event was amazing. The look on Eberle's face was unforgettable. The ceremony was so emotional and moving; it was hard to sing," A Capella member and junior Myah Kube said.

Working with GMC and the Stephen Siller Tunnel to Towers Foundation, an organization dedicated to helping service members who sacrifice limbs, students raised money for the building of a new 'smart' home for the Eberle family. The club Destination

Imagination successfully raised \$3,000 for the new home that will be built in Alpena, Michigan.

Eberle was injured in Afghanistan in 2011 when an improvised explosive device (IED) detonated, and he lost both his legs and his right hand. "The majority of cities have small houses that will not accommodate wheelchairs, doorways, and a larger bathroom and tub to put a shower bench in, things like that," Eberle said after the assembly to the Macomb Tribune. The new home will be equipped with state of the art technology that will allow the wounded vet to safely move around the house. Without the money raised, the house may not have been possible. "I'm never going to forget this for the rest of my life; I really won't—it's something else," Eberle said.

The students in Destination Imagination have left a legacy that will hopefully inspire future projects to be accomplished with equal success. "I think it is very easy sometimes to lose focus and take for granted the freedoms and protection that we have living in the United States of America," Anderson Principal Mr. Michael Ross said. "It is because of people like SSG Ben Eberle that afford us these opportunities," he continued. Thanks to the students at his school and help from others, SSG Eberle will be repaid for his service and gain freedom of mobility within his home once again.

The legacy of the Challenger disaster

Few causes are more noble than the expansion of humankind's understanding of the world around them. To give one's life in the pursuit of knowledge is to know that the life was not given in vain. Over 30 years ago, at 11:39 a.m. on Jan. 28, 1986, seven brave men and women died when the Challenger Space Shuttle exploded just 73 seconds after launch. The cause was determined to be a broken seal on a fuel tank, cracked by the abnormally low temperatures in Cape Canaveral that day.

The initial and lasting impacts of the disaster are massive and far-reaching, so much so that they are still felt today. "[The Challenger disaster] was the first disaster that led to the end of the shuttle program," Ms. Catherine Jasionowicz (better known as CJ), the astronomy teacher at the Center for Advanced Studies and Arts (CASA), said. "Presidents began to see more problems than benefits [to sending] people into space. The risks outweigh the rewards." The Challenger disaster was the first nail in the coffin for the

already underfunded shuttle program. Then, 17 years later, on Feb. 1, 2003, the Columbia space shuttle disintegrated upon reentry into the Earth's atmosphere, killing all seven people on board. The shuttle program officially ended in 2011, and space exploration has further fallen out of the public's interest ever since.

The Challenger was to be the first shuttle mission to carry an ordinary citizen into space. President Ronald Reagan wished to put a regular civilian onboard to reignite the public's interest in space travel, which had been dwindling since the Apollo program (which that sent people to the moon) ended. Christa McAuliffe, a high school science teacher, was

selected to travel with the crew into space, and while there, she would broadcast zero-gravity experiments to students around the nation. Her students, along with the rest of the nation, were watching when the Challenger shuttle exploded.

The impacts of the disaster were not wholly negative. Jasionowicz went on to say that 10 of McAuliffe's students became teachers to honor her. The nation did become more interested and invested in scientific advance—for a time. It is important to never forget

Exactly 390 years before the Challenger disaster, another explorer, Sir Francis Drake, died off the coast of Panama. In his speech honoring the crew of the Challenger, President Reagan said, "In [Drake's] lifetime the great frontiers were the oceans, and an historian later

said, 'He lived by the sea, died on it, and was buried in it.' Well, today we can say of the Challenger crew: their dedication was, like Drake's, complete."

Never forget the sacrifices made in the name of knowledge. It is the highest price to pay, and those who pay it, often pay it readily. To again quote President Reagan's national address, "The crew of the Space Shuttle Challenger honored us by the manner in which they lived their lives. We will never forget them, nor the last time we saw them, as they prepared for their journey and waved goodbye and slipped the surly bonds of the Earth to touch the face of God."

Still controversial to have a black quarterback: And yes, it's 2016

This past Super Bowl had several intriguing storylines, which included Broncos' quarterback Peyton Manning's final game before retirement, the major upset of the Broncos victory over the Panthers, and the fantastic season of MVP Cam Newton coming to a tragic end. But, more importantly, the most controversial topic going into the Super Bowl was Cam Newton's on-field antics.

Newton, the quarterback of the Panthers, is known for emphatic touchdown celebrations. He made "The Dab" popular, as well as "The Superman," when he would pretend to rip his jersey open to reveal a fictitious Superman "S" underneath. The majority of people loved Newton's celebrations and enthusiasm for the game, but others were not as approving. It was sometimes thought of as "immature" or "childish" to act the way Newton has on the field, but there is possibly another factor leading those fans to come to that conclusion.

On Jan. 28, just over a week before the Superbowl, Newton said in an interview, "I'm an African American quarterback; that scares people." And this theory toward his criticism definitely holds some water. In a poll conducted by ESPN's Darren Rovell, 81 percent of black fans voted that they like Newton's celebrations, compared to just 51 percent of white fans. Additionally, going into the Super Bowl, it seemed as if all any journalist could think to ask Newton was regarding his race and his celebrations, and there were rarely any questions about his spectacular season on the field.

What also went under the radar for a while but is now being brought to attention is the fact that after every touchdown celebration, Newton would give the ball to a young fan sitting behind the endzone, which sparked a great new tradition in Carolina. Now in every city, young Panthers fans line the end zone wall after every Newton touchdown, waiting for the memory of a lifetime which could be provided by the star quarterback.

The most bothersome thing about the criticism of Newton's celebrations is that the most elite quarterbacks in the league do emphatic celebrations as well, but somehow they do not get the heat for it that Newton does, simply because they are the stereotypical white quarterback. For example, the "Golden Boy" of the NFL, Tom Brady, spikes the football, screaming and headbutting teammates after he scores, and Drew Brees yells and dances every pregame with his New Orleans Saints' teammates, and occasionally lays the ball up

through the goalposts as a celebration. More notably, Packers' quarterback Aaron Rodgers has his "Discount Double Check" celebration, in which he pretends to wrap a title belt around his waist, and that is currently featured in State Farm commercials, giving Rodgers a huge endorsement deal.

Perhaps the average white quarterback is able to get away with these on-field antics because there are so many of them—out of the 32 NFL teams, just six have an African American starting quarterback. This makes it almost impossible for them to stand out for their performance and not their skin color in comparison to other players who hold their position; this leads to unfair criticism that can easily apply to the majority of starting quarterbacks, including those amongst the most popular of all time like Brady or Rodgers.

So, if Peyton Manning were to steal Newton's "Dab," or Brady pretended to be Superman, would anyone really care? But if Newton were to headbut his teammates or dunk on the goalposts, it would make headline news as to how he "isn't

mature enough to be a quarterback." Senior Emma Harbert said, "I just think [Newton] would not receive the same amount of criticism he does if he were white."

In 1988, Washington
Redskins' quarterback
Doug Williams
became the first African
American quarterback to play in, and win, the

American quarterback to play in, and win, the Super Bowl. Since Williams, there have been several African American quarterbacks to play in the Super Bowl, recently including Colin Kaepernick and Russell Wilson. Yet, because of Newton's emphatic and joyful style of play, he is more heavily criticized because of the color of his skin, which was an issue seemingly defeated by Williams in 1988, but has somehow, embarrassingly, resurfaced all the way in 2016.



Possible discrimination in the film industry results in zero black Oscar nominations

Movies like *Creed*, *Straight Outta Compton*, and *Beasts of No Nation* entered the Oscar nomination conversation as prime candidates for an Academy Award to be won by black actors or actresses. However, on Jan. 14, when the nominations were released, the Academy failed to nominate any black actors or actresses to any of the 20 slots in the four acting categories. The award show, held on Feb. 28, will not have any black actors or actresses nominated for the second year in a row.

Social media users were outraged this time last year, creating the trending hashtag "#OscarSoWhite," referring to the lack of minority nominations. This year, the subject has picked back up and has been elevated to a new level. Actor Will Smith and his wife, actress Jada Pinkett Smith, along with Director Spike Lee, are boycotting the Oscars and will not attend the show. The frustration felt by all people, especially black actors and actresses, is understood. In reality, the movie industry is dominated by Caucasian males and has been since film's conception.

The ethnicity breakdown for the 88th Academy Awards nominations in major categories which include Acting, Writing, and Directing, left white people with 95.3 percent of the nominees (41), leaving Asian and Hispanic/Latinos at only 2.1 percent (one percent each), and African Americans with none.

With the exception of Sidney Poitier, who in 1963 was the first African American to win a Best Actor in a Leading Role award, the next black actor or actress to win the award came 38 years later in 2001 when Halle Berry and Denzel Washington both won the award in their respective genders. In 90 years of the ceremony's existence, just four black males and one black female have won the award for the Best Actor in a Leading Role.

Senior Lauren Angel said, "The board that makes the nominations is mostly white, so they will vote for the movies that attract to them. Black movies mainly attract black audiences. Not many white people go and see the black movies."

Straight Outta Compton, a movie describing the rise of rap group N.W.A, starred four young, black actors. This exceptional film, which grossed over 200 million dollars worldwide, received only one nominee for "Best Original Screenplay." The sole nomination will be credited to Jonathan Herman, a self-described "white, Jewish, gay guy from Connecticut" and his white writing partner, Andrea Berloff.

Other award ceremonies, including the Screen Actors Guild Awards, have given credit where credit is due. Both *Straight Outta Compton* and *Beasts of No Nation* received nominations for Outstanding Performance by a Cast in a Motion Picture, along with Idris Elba in his supporting role in Beasts of No Nation.

This "whiteout" trend cannot be by chance or simply a glitch in the system, it is a clear, racially driven problem. A survey held in 2013 by the Screen Actors Guild (SAG), an American union for film performers, suggests that 70 percent of its members are white. If all of the Guild's members were equally likely to receive Oscar nominations, regardless of race, then over a two-year period, 28 out of 40 nominations would be of white actors. The chances of no black actor or actress being nominated in two consecutive ceremonies comes to around one in 100,000. Angel continued, "It is definitely a racial issue, and it has been going on for a long time."

The Academy has noticeably attempted to change regarding their accused racial discrimination in the industry. They have announced that by 2020, the female and minority membership within the buisness will double.

The curious case of Julian Assange

The value that society assigns to absolute moral purity is arbitrary and unnecessary. The fact that Martin Luther King Jr. was adulterous or that Nelson Mandela sanctioned the car-bombing of a South African church in 1983 does not make them bad people or reflect poorly on their larger achievements. They are good people who made mistakes in their lives. Therefore, the opposite should also be true—when bad people do great things, their achievements should not be invalidated. This is very much the case with Julian Assange.

Julian Assange is the founder of Wikileaks, a website that provides a secure forum where whistleblowers can leak documents that reveal the illegal activities of a government, corporation, or other such institution. The most important information revealed on Wikileaks includes documents on the corruption of the former Kenyan president and video of American soldiers shooting unarmed journalists in Baghdad, leaked by Chelsea Manning, who is now serving 35 years in prison for disclosing government documents. Assange currently has political asylum in the Ecuadorian Embassy in London, where he has been since 2012. He is avoiding extradition (where a government hands an individual over to whichever jurisdiction the crime he or she stands accused of was committed in) to Sweden, where he was accused of rape and molestation, which would likely then result in extradition to the United States, where a fate similar to Manning would await him. In January, the United Nations ruled that he is being arbitrarily detained by Britain and Sweden, effectively granting Assange the support of the UN.

Assange is not a good person. He often leaks documents with reckless abandon, simply because the producer of the information is in a position of power; a notable example of this is the publishing of former CIA Chief John O'Bannon's entire personal email. In an op-ed for the New York Times, journalist Jochen Bittner said of cases like these that "the underlying scandal, it would seem to Mr. Assange, is that these are evil people who must be exposed. Don't trust anyone, everybody who keeps secrets is bad, regardless of the reasons they keep them."

Some secrets should be kept. It is damaging to the reputation of Wikileaks to randomly leak irrelevant documents like these, and it diminishes the impact of uncovering real corruption or criminal activity.

Speaking on the accusations set against Assange, if it turns out that he did rape the woman who accused him (which he fervently denies) and goes to prison for it, excellent. He doesn't deserve to live free if that is the case. But what is not acceptable is the notion that Assange could be put in prison for the rest of his life or a majority of his life for assisting in the uncovering of government corruption.

On certain matters, especially ones like NSA mass surveillance, change and accountability is not coming from within the system. The general public would never have found out about NSA surveillance if not for Edward Snowden, who leaked information on it in 2013. It is unconscionable that Manning is serving 35 years in prison for leaking information on war crimes, especially considering the soldiers who slaughtered the journalists never saw punishment. These are people who need protection because they are the watchdogs of freedom—Julian Assange included.

The person himself and the actions of the person can be separated. Assange has done and said some awful things, but what he created is an incredible advantage in the protection and promotion of democracy. If he is to go to prison, let it be for a legitimate reason and not as just an attempt by the world's governments to silence him and those like him.



STUDENTS TO ASSIST VICTIMS OF FLINT WATER CRISIS:

KIDS DISTRIBUTE HUNDREDS OF FREE WATER BOTTLES

This past month, the state of Michigan has made national news—but in a terrible way. It was recently discovered that the water supply in Flint, MI was contaminated with a high amount of lead. Consumption of this tainted water causes several health problems; most significantly it can cause damage to the nervous system. Michigan governor Rick Snyder has done next to nothing to help those in need, but fortunately, other citizens all around the country are doing their part to support Flint.

Some of the most well-known people to provide aid to the city are rapper Meek Mill, who donated 60 thousand bottles of water; the entire defensive line of the Washington Redskins, who donated nearly four thousand bottles; and Detroit Lions' star defensive end Ziggy Ansah who donated 94 thousand water bottles. The largest donation, though, came from Mark Wahlberg and Sean (Diddy) Combs, who together donated around one million bottles. Even though these are high-profile celebrities, it does not take an upper-class income to help out those in need.

On Jan. 30, the Michigan Carpenters and Millwrights Union organized a bottle drive with students from local schools, including BHS and Ferndale. Students and adults with the Union drove to a church in Flint, where each participant was designated an area to distribute water bottles, leaving them on the doorsteps of every home assigned.


The students were exposed to a type of environment that they had not often encountered before. "It was kind of sad. Everyone we ran into seemed like they were in distress," sophomore Hannah Thomas said. Sophomore Hannah Mulheron added that, "The people that we did run into all asked for more water." Both students agreed that it is important to give aid to Flint not only because the city is near to Berkley, but also because it is the right thing to do to help out those in need.

Although this seems like a simple problem of contamination, there are many other complex issues that are embedded in Flint right now. This all started when a series of state-appointed emergency managers made the decision to switch Flint's

water away from the Detroit system to the Flint River, which was so corrosive that even the General Motors plant nearby would not use it. Since 2014, there have been numerous complaints about the water that Snyder has essentially ignored. Finally, on Jan. 5, still almost a whole month after the mayor of Flint requested a state of emergency, Snyder finally acted, declaring a state of emergency, which then resulted in President Obama allocating federal funds for Flint to help pay for bottles of water and filters. But the question is—why did it take so long? Junior Brendan Radtke said, "I fear that pros and cons were weighed before the decision [was made] to switch Flint's water supply: pros being the low cost, and cons being the poor water quality."

Considering the population of Flint is 60 percent black, racist undertones have been the elephant in the room for Snyder, as some Michigan residents, including journalist and Flint native Michael Moore, are considering this to be a racial issue. A lot of people, including Moore, are calling for a criminal investigation of Snyder. Others just think Snyder was too lazy or incapable to act on the issue, and a man like that should not be the governor of a state, especially one still on the rise from a recent economic crash. Presidential candidates Bernie Sanders and Hillary Clinton called for Snyder to resign. Although seemingly a biased opinion, that is a clear indication of how poorly Snyder is thought of, as calling for a governor's resignation is not taken lightly.

Nonetheless, the Flint water crisis is a terrible, tragic situation, and quite frankly, it is an embarrassment to the state of Michigan. While things are not looking good now, no one has to stand by helplessly and watch the situation get worse. No matter who you are, where you are from, or how much money you have, everyone should be willing to put in the time and effort to provide aid to our fellow Michiganders in the city of Flint.





Netflix Originals: New shows arrive



The 60 seconds of airtime they bought cost around 10 million dollars, which indicates the developers' confidence in the relatively unclear future of the game.

A SUBSCRIPTION BASED WORLD: SOUNDCLOUD TRANSITIONS INTO STREAMING

On Jan. 13, the music streaming site SoundCloud struck a licensing deal with another major label, Universal Music Group. The deal allows SoundCloud to make money off tracks from popular Universal artists such as Sam Smith, U2, and The Weeknd through advertising.

Universal decided to work with the company after SoundCloud executives reiterated that SoundCloud would soon become a paid service. The deal allows Universal to control what songs are available to the general public and what songs will need to be bought in order to hear. Universal will also use the platform as a promotional tool. The company will be collecting data to generate the greatest revenue and gain a strong connection with fans of their artists. With 175 million monthly users, it is safe to say they will have a lot of information to sift through.

Now that SoundCloud is partners with two of the three biggest labels in the world, fans of the service are beginning to wonder when details of the imminent subscription will arise. Many are concerned with the possible price of the service, what will be added to the platform, and how SoundCloud will separate itself from other streaming services such as Tidal, Pandora, and Spotify.

Plenty of Berkley High School listeners have strong opinions on the deal and speculate about the near future of the once independent company. Senior Jayd Mathurin said, "It's a terrible idea to make us users pay to stream music.

They are going to lose a huge amount of users."

In the past year, SoundCloud has been sued by a label from the U.K. and has been threatened by many other labels who do not want their roster of artists to have music posted on the site. "This was a business decision. I respect them for linking up with these music superpowers, but still, I'm not paying for their service. At this point there are plenty of other ways to get free music and listeners who don't want to pay will find a new site to get music," Jayd continued.

Others who are committed to another platform also would not change, even if the price for SoundCloud is lower than what they are already paying. Junior Riley Sawicki said, "I'm a Spotify user, and I don't see a large difference in the platform, so I would not change. All my music is on there and SoundCloud is alright, but I'm not going to pay for another service that has sped up music or even remixes."

Others in the minority are open to the change and would still embrace SoundCloud if they had to pay for the service. "I enjoy SoundCloud, so I would pay for the service. The platform has never disappointed me, and I can see myself sticking with it," senior Jacob Bathish said.

Very few people agree with SoundCloud's latest business decisions and are hesitant to think about living in a world without the free music platform. Though fans can speculate about the future of SoundCloud, all they can do is wait to see what the company puts out to the public.







DYLAN LARKIN: THE FUTURE OF THE RED WINGS

At 19 years old, rookie Red Wing Dylan Larkin almost looks like he could be attending Berkley High School. Instead, he is playing in the NHL on his hometown team, the Detroit Red Wings. Larkin was drafted 15th overall by the Red Wings in the 2014 NHL Entry Draft, and he has 19 goals and 20 assists so far this season for a total of 39 points. "Just being a Red Wing is the best thing that has ever happend to me" Larkin said to the Detroit Free Press.

Born and raised in Waterford Township, Michigan, Larkin started his hockey career at a young age. Instead of playing high school hockey, like most kids involved in the sport, Larkin played on the USA National Development Team. The team ended up beating Switzerland in the Development league Championship with Larkin recording 13 goals and 14 assists in the tournament.

After winning, Larkin went on to play for the University of Michigan. In his freshman year, he had a total of 14 points: seven goals and seven assists. Larkin averaged the most points per game of any freshman collegiate hockey player in the last 60 years, with 1.5 per game. In the Big Ten Championship Tournament, he broke the record for most points in a championship game, with one goal and three assists.

After his first year of college, Larkin declared for the entry draft. He made his first NHL

start on Oct. 9, 2015, becoming the first 19-year-old Red Wing to do so since Jiri Fischer in 1990. On Oct. 15, Larkin recorded his first NHL point with an assist early in the first period, then his first goal in that same game. Later in the season, Larkin scored a goal each in four consecutive games, the first Red Wings rookie to do so since Steve Yzerman, one of the best Red Wings and NHL players of all time." I think he is the most underrated player in the NHL" said freshman hockey player Marcus Frankel.

Larkin was given the honor of attending the NHL All-Star game as a rookie, and he is the first rookie Red Wing to attend the All-Star game since Steve Yzerman in 1984. While there, Larkin broke the all-time record for speed skating around the rink, the previous record was 13.386 seconds, set by Mike Gartner in 1996 Larkin finished with a 13.17 second time, creating a new record and solidifying his status as a legitimate All-Star in the league. "He is going to be an outstanding player throughout the rest of his career" Frankel added.

Right now, Larkin is in good company with a team that has a large number of veterans that can help make him a better NHL player, and a group of young players with whom he can relate to and create chemistry with. Many fans believe a long, prosperous career is in store for this young Michigan native.

Politicians, you are not medical professionals

In 1973, the Supreme Court ruled in a landmark case titled Roe v. Wade that it was a woman's right to choose whether or not she could have an abortion. They cited the Right to Privacy in the 14th amendment as the constitutional reasoning behind their 7-2 ruling.

At the time, this decision was controversial, and since then there have been many who have repeatedly challenged and disagreed with the court's ruling based upon their own moral or religious views. Even though the ruling still stands, conservative legislators have worked to make it more difficult for women to have access to these medical operations. In some states, it has become almost impossible for women to have an abortion even though it is their right as protected by federal law.

Even though only 19 percent of the population believes that no abortion should be permitted under any circumstances, state laws have been the cause of numerous clinics closing. In the states of Mississippi, North Dakota, South Dakota, and Missouri, there is now only one clinic throughout each state.

The reason that states have been able to make decisions regarding abortion because of another Supreme Court ruling, Planned Parenthood v. Casey. In this case, it was decided that the right to an abortion would remain legal, but states could place restrictions on that right as long as it was not an "undue burden" on the woman. This means an obstacle significant enough to be a burden on a person's fundamental rights. This provision is vague, and has given states the freedom to create and enforce laws that they believe fall within the legal limits outlined in the ruling, resulting in an increased difficulty for women to receive proper health care.

States have begun to institute TRAP laws, or targeted regulations of abortion providers. These laws are created to single out abortion providers and impose regulations on them that other medical practices do not have to abide by. Those who support these laws say that the reason for their creation is the protection of women's health, but in reality they are working to do the exact opposite. They are an attempt to inhibit a woman's choice and jeopardize their access to a safe and legal reproductive choice. These laws have allowed politicians to end abortion access without breaking any federal laws because they are said to be an attempt to protect women.

For example, many states have enacted laws that require clinics to have admitting privileges to local hospitals, but these are difficult to obtain, especially in certain states where hospitals can refuse to accept them because they do not want to be caught up in abortion politics, therefore making the operation of these clinics impossible. Most first trimester procedures either entail taking medication like a pill or an operation that requires no cutting and is minimally invasive, meaning there is no need to have admitting privileges. If there is a very rare complication, even without admitting privileges a patient would just go to the nearest hospital and receive treatment and if the doctor had any questions they would just have to ask the doctor who performed the abortion. Clearly, these these laws are legislators' backdoor attempt to inhibit legal abortion.

Medical associations such as the American Medical Association (AMA) and the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ACOG) have publicly opposed TRAP regulations. The AMA is the largest professional association of physicians, residents, and medical students in the United States, and the ACOG is an organization created to protect women's health with evidence-based practice guidelines. The AMA and ACOG submitted an amicus curiae brief, which is an outside opinion on a courtcase, in the case Whole Woman's Health v. Hellerstedt that states "H.B. 2 [TRAP laws implemented by Texas] imposes government regulation on abortion care that is not based on scientific facts or the best available medical knowledge...there is simply no medical basis for requiring that abortion facilities meet the standards for ambulatory surgical centers ("ASC requirement") or for enforcing a local admitting privileges requirement against abortion providers ("privileges requirement")." The fact that the opinions of well respected medical professional are being disregarded by politicians is ridiculous. People that make policy should be looking to experts for advice so that they can make the most informed and safe decisions instead of letting their personal beliefs overshadow what is right.

Legislation has also implemented certain hoops for not only the clinic, but women themselves to jump through when they make the choice to have an abortion. In some states, women have to see a sonogram of the fetus as well as listen to someone describe it in intricate detail. If they do not wish to see it their only option is to cover their ears and their eyes. In other places, the states require medical professionals to inform women of the "risks" associated with the procedure, even though some of them are based in little to no evidence. It is a person's right to receive informed consent on all medical procedures, but 32 states have taken advantage of this right by adding informed consent mandates to abortion. Instead of receiving information to help them accurately and better understand what they are about to go though, women are receiving information that is not intended to inform them of their choice, but rather scare and dissuade them from making it. For example, in a few states, doctors have to tell patients that there is an increased chance of developing breast cancer if one has an abortion even though the National Cancer Institute has come out as saying that it is "well-established" that "induced abortion is not associated with an increase in breast cancer risk."

The idea that Republican lawmakers are looking out for a woman's best interest is not reflected in their policy to make abortion impractical or altogether impossible. When abortion is not legal, women are then forced to use desperate and unsafe measures to end a pregnancy or have a child when they are not ready or suitable to be a parent. The fact that politics have made it so that medical professionals can and are forced to tell false information is completely unethical and unacceptable. What was granted to women through Roe v. Wade is being chipped away and many women are being left without access to their constitutional right.
